decided to convene the GBM proposing to undertake adoption of a village for undertaking social work and to expand deeper the grassroots connect between the stakeholder of the University and the community. It also proposed to prepare a blueprint to support students from the under-privileged children in their pursuit of higher education besides organising seminars, symposiums and conferences and to undertake an extensive membership drive to expand the membership of the Alumni Association. But in view of the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic, and the closure of the University since the 17th of March, it was neither possible to go ahead with the GBM or undertake and implement any other proposed community development programme by the Association. However due to the persistence of the pandemic situation and the accompanying restrictions, the decisions taken by the Association could not be implemented despite the earnest desire of the Executive Members.
