The Department of Linguistics is organizing a National Conference on Revisiting Indology and Sanskrit in India. The proposed conference is a culmination of two events: (1) Conference on Sanskrit and (2) Conference on Indology. The focus of the twin event is to initiate a debate in a refreshingly new way on the issues of empowering, promoting and developing Sanskrit. On the other hand, focus of the event is also to initiate a new discourse on Indology. Such a shift in focus requires a new lens for interpreting Sanskrit and Indology. The western ideology of Indology needs to be liberated. We need to develop insider's views.

Sanskrit has played a role of unifying language in the past. Sanskrit texts are still vital to understanding our history and contribution to the Indic philosophy and art since time immemorial. The proposed event attempts to transcend traditional disciplinary boundaries in an effort to think more deeply about Sanskrit and Indology. The descriptive account of the pertinent issues relating to ideological interdisciplinary studies as an interface envisages a profound understanding of the different interrelated subject matter crossdisciplinary to procure a meaningful comprehension of language in particular and social sciences in general. Therefore, the thrust areas and the theme of the

conference correspond to different interrelation, theoretical and descriptive approaches to broaden the horizon, scope and perspective of Sanskrit as a language of wider communication and significance.

Additionally, this conference endeavours foster a meaningful academic which will interlocution encourage scholars from various fields to contribute to this discussion. Furthermore, it could provide the essential theoretical framework for re-conceiving Sanskrit and Indology from a more realistic non-western perspective. It intends to promote Sanskrit language that has been the most important medium in lending continuity to Indian civilization and linguistic Scenario in the Asian context. It seeks to serve as an avenue for a cerebral deliberation on themes and issues having a bearing on or connection with the theoretical development based on the existing theories and practices such as the unit of analysis and the dynamic nature of Sanskrit in relation to societies. This earnest endeavour is a pertinent subject area in the present scenario as it is concerned with studies that carry crucial socio-symbolic importance as it actually identifies and thus serves as the emblem of societies, communities, religions, regions and traditions.

The conference will be appropriate to understanding the social, philosophical

and geographical boundaries of Sanskrit used and practised by the speech communities, philosophers, professionals, and academicians. In particular, the conference attempts to highlight the sociocultural, historical, literary and traditional dimensions in India. The conference will report on the use of Sanskrit found among the various linguistic regions in different parts of the country.
