**Date: 13th July, 2024:** Department of Law, North-Eastern Hill University in collaboration with ICSSR-NERC organized One Day Workshop on three New Criminal Laws 2023 at NEHU Campus, on 13th July 2024. The Director General of Police, Meghalaya, Smt. I Nongrang, I.P.S. was the Chief Guest of the inaugural session. She spoke in length about the salient features and procedural intricacies about the three new Criminal Laws and she also highlighted about the responsible policing and need for newer guidelines and SOP for the sake of justice. She pointed out some of the challenges for introducing new things like electronic documentary evidences. “The competition of the two rivers.”*



Once upon a time, U Lei Shyllong, the deity of Shillong, had two beautiful twin daughters named ‘Ka Ngot’ and ‘Ka Iam’. They were very close and always together. One day, they climbed to the top of Shillong Peak and admired the stunning view below. Ka Iam, who was the more adventurous sister, challenged Ka Ngot to a race. The sisters decided to start the race from the bottom of Shillong Peak, with the finish line in the plains of Sylhet. They turned into rivers and began the race.
